Kindergarten Title I Week of June 1

Welcome to our last week of school!

 Alphabet --Continue to practice any letters and/or sounds your child doesn't know.

You have reviewed all the short vowel sounds with your child already. Continue to practice three letter words (examples: can, hot, pin, bug, etc.). If you want to challenge your child a little, introduce the sounds of /sh/ /th/ and /ch/ (one at a time) and have them read and spell words with those. Some examples: shut, this, chat, etc.

If your child is doing well with all of these skills, add some two-letter blends, like sl, bl, br, cr, etc. See if they can hear all FOUR sounds in a word and write them down. Here are some example words:

Clap, slid, Brad, drip, flat

2. Education.com -- Our students' subscriptions to Education.com are still accessible from home. Instructions to access these lessons are below. 5. Each week we practice nursery rhymes in Title I. Ask your child to show you "Goosey Goosey Gander:"


